Primates belong to an order of mammals who have large brains, are very reliant on vision, and still retain many adaptations (such as opposable thumbs) for life in the trees, although many of them no longer live in an arboreal environment. Primates include monkeys, chimpanzees, lemurs, gibbons, humans, gorillas, orangutans, marmosets, tamarins, lorises, aye ayes, galagos and tarsiers.

Amazonia

Discovery Center

- 2. Largest: gorilla, smallest: lesser mouse lemur (signage at Lemur Forest)
- 3. Lemurs floated to Madagascar from Africa about on rafts of vegetation (Lemur Forest)

Kley Building

- 1. Komodo Dragon (sign in Komodo Cove)
- 2. False, about 1/5 of snakes give birth to live young (see reptile info wall in Kley building)
- Common basilisk because it has the ability to run on top of the water (reptile wall)
- 4. In response to light, temperature and heat (reptile info wall in Kley building)
- 5. Draco Lizards (reptile wall)
- 6. Birds (reptile wall)
- 7. Tool use (reptile wall)
- 8. Pygmy Loris (Creatures of the Night room)
- 9. Mechi, our Indian Rhinoceros, is missing her horn; it was removed because it became infected, but should grow back. (Lower Level Kley or outside on the Rhino Reserve)

Children's Enchanted Forest (CEF)

- 1. 30,000 species of spiders; false, not all spiders build webs, although all can spin silk (see giant rope spider web in CEF)
- 2. River Otters (CEF)
- 3. Build a dam (see sign at otter exhibit, CEF)
- 4. White Mantled Colobus Monkey (CEF)

<u>Asia</u>

- Sichuan Takin (Asia) (Fun fact: the head of the Beast from Beauty and the Beast was modeled from a takin!)
- 2. Our Malayan Sun Bear, like Winnie the Pooh, loves honey (Asia)
- 3. Antlers (see sign at the Barasingha across from Sun Bear)
- 4. Fat (Franklin is our Bactrian camel) (Asia)
- 5. The Sarus crane
- 6. Gibbon (Asia)

Australia

- 1. Kookaburra
- 2. You wouldn't, since Emu dads exclusively take care of the young (Australia)

African Panorama

- 1. Abyssinian Ground Hornbill (see sign across from Donna the Hippo playground)
- 2. The Ostrich can run 40 mph (see Ostrich sign along Tanzania Trail below African Panorama)
- 3. Grey Crowned Crane (signs African Panorama overlook)
- 4. Tagua Nut (see gift shop)
